

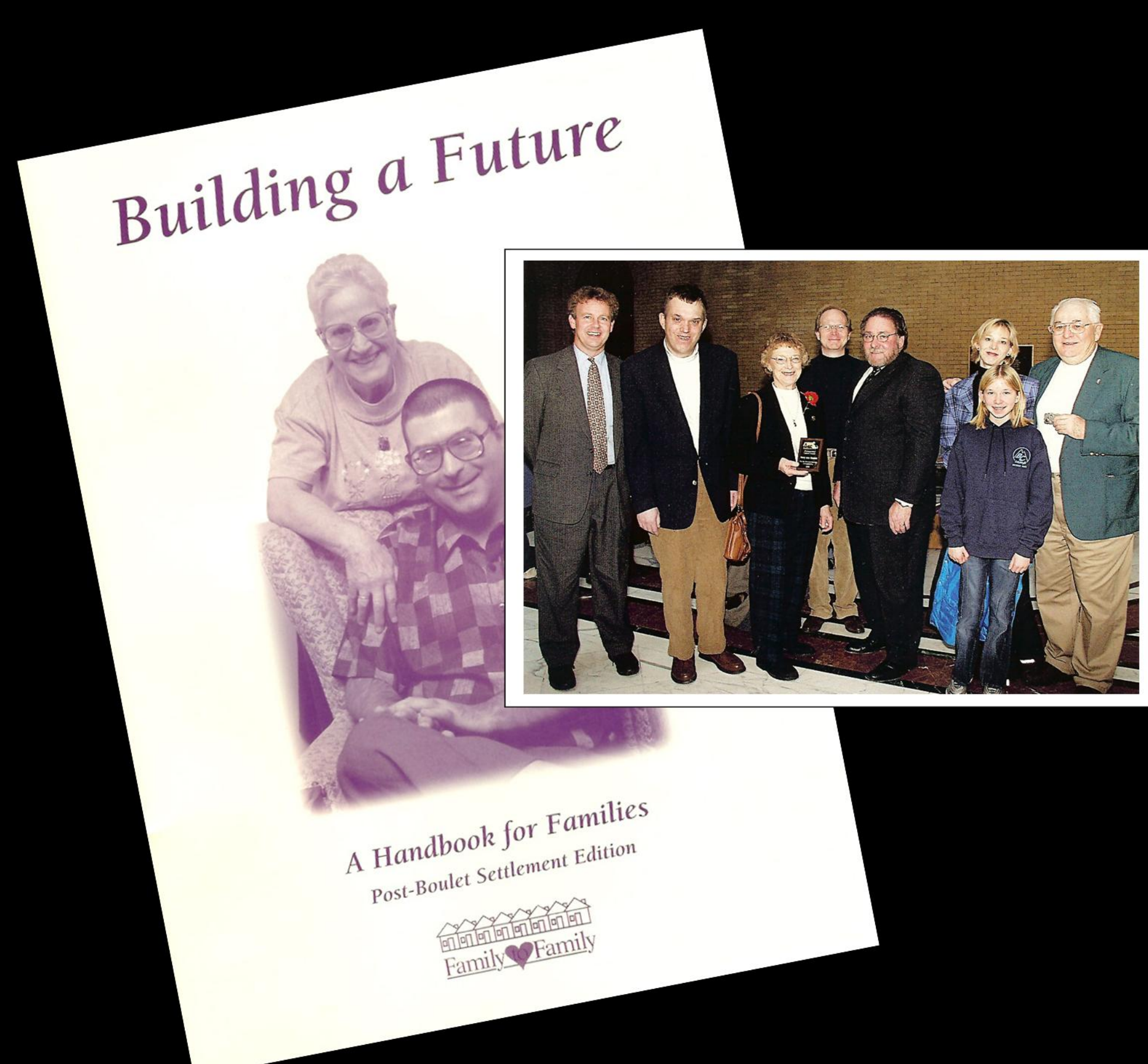

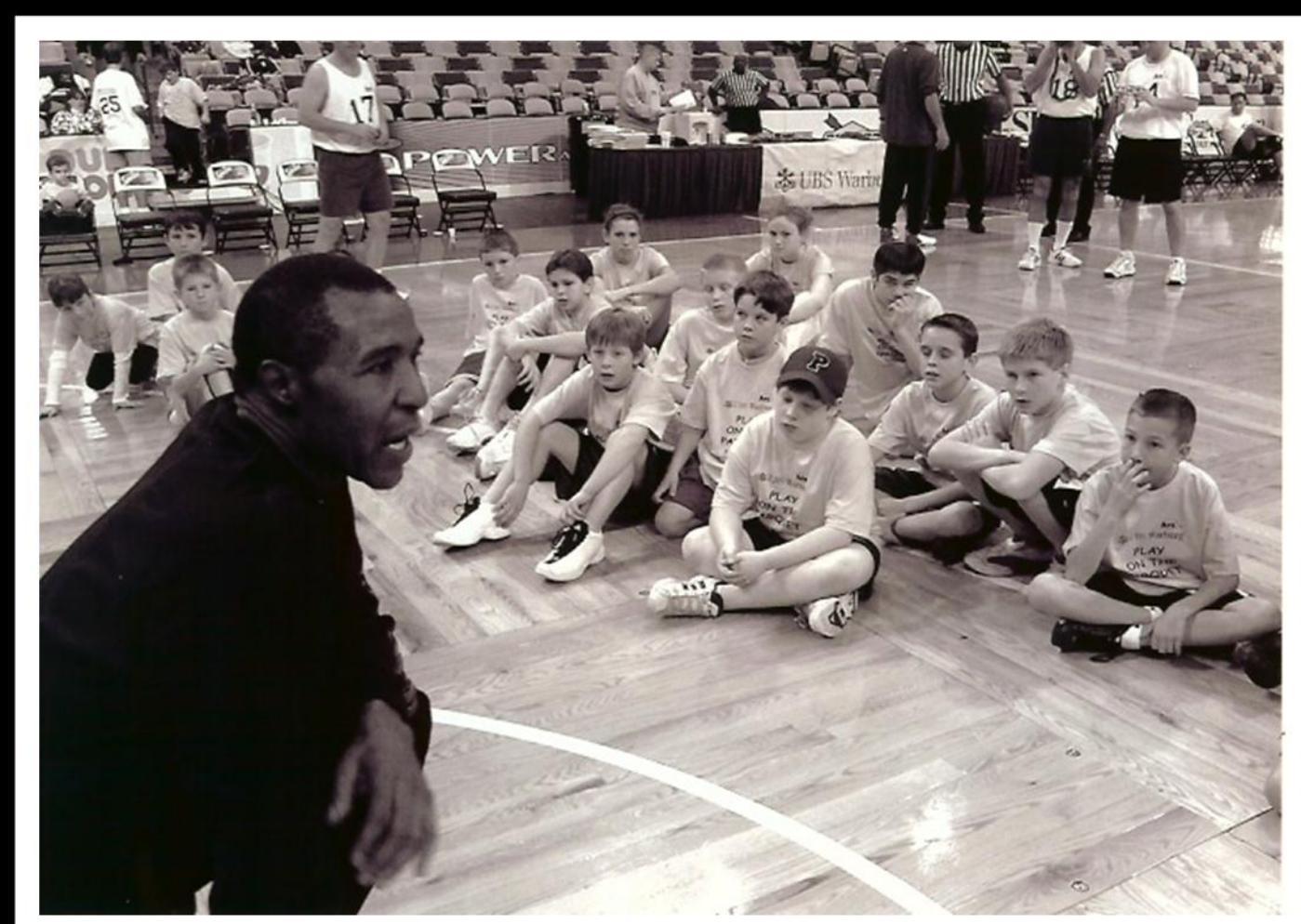
The decade opens with a huge victory for families with the settlement of the Arc-sponsored Boulet lawsuit which provides for services for 2444 people on the DMR Waiting List.
